







MR. L. C. WENDT

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
VERGIL, 1930



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
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Administration

- THE ACTS-1. Also the Seniors did garb themselves in strange attire, putting away serious things and did resort to disguises upon Senior Day


2. And at that season among the tribe of Seniors there were those who did gather upon the stage, these being players of many parts.



W K. P A. HOLDS LUNCHEON MEETING



WORLD ENDURANCE TITLE PERMANENTLY SETTLED




Seventh Grade



Very much progress has been made during this past year in which several new Scouts have started at the bottom and worked up along with the older ones still climbing in the ranks of Scouting.



Girl Reserves



The Hi-Y Club had a very successful year which started with school in the fall, and continued throughout the school year




Boys' Glee Club



Making his second team of the 1929 basket ball squad into his first team of 1930, he produced a fighting team which lost but three season games and fought its way to the regional finals.


A coach who can accomplish so much from so little, who can obtain the confidence of his boys, and obtain every ounce of fight from them, deserves to be praised for his work.


CADILLAC-7-MT PLEASANT 7


Golf and Tennis
