#### School Leaders Act on Matters From Report

The Mt. Pleasant Board of Education spent many nights this year setting up a new bond issue to service adequately the estimated 300person increase in secondary school enrollment. Two junior high school buildings, additions to the present senior high structure. additional land for an athletic field and construction of an auditorium to seat 900 were planned. Remodeling of the central kitchen, the old post office building and certain elementary schools was also proposed. The total new bond issue would come to around four million dollars and would be retired over a 29-year period. Turned down at the polls, the proposal was due to be revised by the board and submitted again at a later election.

This year the administration has worked on a new student progress report system that will be put in use during the 1964-5 school year. The new system will cut down on the timeconsuming clerical work of the teachers and will provide a compact, permanent record of the student's progress.

There will be a tablet of seven color-keyed papers for each class, allowing the grade to be marked on the top sheet and preserved on the lower sheets. The top sheet will then be taken off and given to the student. For each successive marking period, all the previous grades will be shown.

The system is now being used at many other high schools.
